AUDIENCE PARTICIPATION

Dave Rudoi attorney for Bazonzoes requested to be placed on the future agenda discussion of an amendment to hours of operation for the two marijuana provisioning stores in the C-2 district to operate until 11 p.m.. Attorney Rudoi explained there was a first reading council approved for the C-3 district only. Attorney Rudoi explained this agenda item was removed from further discussions. Attorney Rudoi explained neither of the businesses in the C-2 locations are located near a park. Attorney Rudoi opined it would make a lot of sense to have further discussions on the hours of operation because it would benefit the businesses, more hours provide more opportunities to have customers throughout the day at different times keeping the traffic less.

City Manager Whitt explained to Attorney Rudoi and for the record, the statement of being close to the park is not at all correct. City Manager Whitt explained the agenda item was removed at his request and the people along the city street Spring Park who abut one of the provisioning centers in the C-2 district. City Manager Whitt explained that is not a park it is a city street, and that is a mistake by Attorney Rudoi from the beginning. City Manager Whitt explained the provisioning center that abuts Spring Park. City Manager Whitt opined Spring Park residents took a beating to begin with when that building was built. City Manager Whitt explained extending the hours of operation negatively affects the people in the residential area.

Chris Conklin, Corrigan Oil – explained he has a client trying to get a fuel tank placed behind his facility. Mr. Conklin provided a handout to the council. Mr. Conklin said he is the project manager for Corrigan Oil, petroleum construction is his purview. Mr. Conklin explained they are not trying to get a marina for the business, they are trying to get a 1,000-gallon fuel dispenser behind the Barrels of Wine facility. Mr. Conklin said he contacted the city and was told it was ok to place the tank. Mr. Conklin said he was since told the tank is not permitted. Mr. Conklin

said the oil in Walled Lake is from people filling their boats from personal containers. Mr. Conklin explained his tank is certified, does not leak, is the safest system, and can be three feet from a building. Mr. Conklin said the State of Michigan deems this tank as one of the safest.

Ken Holmes, 905 E. Walled Lake Drive – explained he is a proponent of the installation of the proposed fuel tank. Mr. Holmes explained as people get older it gets tougher to carry gas cans to the boats on the lake, to fill them. Mr. Holmes said it would be beneficial to have a gas-fueling station on the lake.

Brian Gillam 1280 E. Lake Drive – explained he has been a resident of Novi for 12 years. Mr. Gillman explained he likes the idea of a fueling station on the lake. Mr. Gillam said having a fueling station on Walled Lake is good. Mr. Gillman said no matter what you do, gas is spilled into the lake from fueling boats. Mr. Gillam said he is requesting a filling station at Barrels of Wine.

Eddie Hesano, 136 E Walled Lake Drive – said he is proposing a tank at his facility because there is a need. Mr. Hesano said there is a need for a gas station on the lake. Mr. Hesano said there are other lakes that have fueling stations. Mr. Hesano said he has been at his store for 11 years and over that time he has watched much gas spilling into the lake. Mr. Hesano said everybody is supporting his proposal. Mr. Hesano said the tank and pump are safe, once the tank is full there is a stop guard, so it does not pump any further. Mr. Hesano said there once was a Shell gas station at his location prior to it becoming a party store.

Deborah Holmes, 905 E. Walled Lake Drive – said she highly supports a fueling station on the lake. Ms. Holmes said she is getting older, and it is harder to lift gas cans, it will be great for the people on Walled Lake.

City Manager Whitt explained there were filings with the Michigan Liquor Control Commission (MLCC) against the Tiki Bar and Boil. City Manager Whitt explained this stems from their illegal car event at the Tiki Bar which caused several problems in the neighborhood. City Manager Whitt explained one of the financial fines issued by the MLCC to the Tiki Bar was for \$300.

Police Chief Shakinas explained there were two charges issued by the MLCC, one charge was for failing to obtain city permits.

City Manager Whitt explained that Sunset Grill L.L.C. does business as the Tiki Bar and they violate their own rules. City Manager Whitt said the businesses have to comply; you cannot just throw an event. City Manager Whitt explained at the direction of the council, investigations of this illegal event were completed. City Manager Whitt explained businesses need to cooperate. City Manager Whitt explained businesses in violation will be pursued to have their liquor licenses suspended and potential fees and penalties will apply from other enforcing agencies. City Manager Whitt said we want to keep the community safe, and the businesses that hold a liquor license need to be made aware of this.

CORRESPONDENCE

1. Mr. Robert Wittenberg, Oakland County Treasurer – Oakland County Treasurer's Office Foreclosure Prevention

Finance Director Pesta read into the record the correspondence from Oakland County Treasurer Robert Wittenberg.

The Oakland County Treasurer's Office is in the final stretch of our Foreclosure Prevention efforts. The tax foreclosure deadline for the 2020 or prior year taxes is on March 31st, 2023. That means if these taxes aren't paid off by March 31st or any interested party hasn't entered into a repayment schedule with the Treasurer's office by then, the property will be foreclosed.

Since December of 2022, the Treasurer's office has conducted over a thousand Taxpayer Assistance Meetings to assist taxpayers with keeping their properties by working with them to get on a repayment schedule and/or by identifying resources that may be beneficial to them and their situation. We are here to help and strongly encourage taxpayers to contact us before the tax foreclosure deadline if they have delinquent taxes for 2020 or prior tax years. Taxpayers interested in scheduling a Taxpayer Assistance Meeting may call us at 248-858-0611 or they may visit www.oakgov.com/treasurer

Some of the resources available to assist taxpayers include:

• Michigan Homeowners Assistance Fund (MIHAF) which is a state grant that will cover up to \$25K for delinquent taxes (2019 and forward), mortgage payments, and utility bills. Must be a primary residence, make <150% AMI, and prove covid hardship in order to qualify. Apply at mihaf.michigan.gov.

• Financial Empowerment Center in the Treasurer's Office which provides one-on-one financial coaching and services to help taxpayers achieve their financial goals. Contact Reda at <u>nafsor@oakgov.com</u> or 248-807-5287.

• Lakeshore Legal Aid provides free legal services to people who are low income and seniors. 1-888-783-8190 is the number for new clients.

ATTORNEY'S REPORT

City Attorney Vanerian explained in addition to violations issued by the Michigan Liquor Control Commission, the Tiki Bar was issued citations from the city for violations of local ordinances. City Attorney Vanerian explained the Tiki Bar said it was not their event. City Attorney Vanerian explained if the event is on your property, it is your event, and you are responsible for it.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS

1. Lot split proposal regarding 850 Ladd, Building E.

City Attorney Vanerian explained the reconsideration of the lot split proposal for 850 Ladd, Building E is back before the council this evening for approval. City Attorney Vanerian explained the applicant Turning Point LLC owns 850 Ladd, Building E. City Attorney Vanerian explained this complex was all one parcel when it was first developed with one owner. City Attorney Vanerian explained over the years the parcel was split into individual parcels. City Attorney Vanerian explained Turning Point's parking lot encroaches on city property and the lot split proposal is to split the parcel from the city lot and add to the Turning Point lot which will resolve the encroachment issue. City Attorney Vanerian explained the City Council did not approve the proposal when first presented in August of 2022. City Attorney Vanerian explained, since that time, the principal of Turning Point, Mr. Don Leith, has really stepped up and made some significant contributions to the city such as abating long-standing blight issues in the city. Which has been a priority of the city. City Attorney Vanerian explained Mr. Leith has voluntarily cleaned up and torn down a deteriorated guard shack at the 850 Ladd Road complex entrance. City Attorney Vanerian explained Mr. Leith has now partnered with another property owner to demolish the hazardous water tower on the 850 Ladd Road complex. City Attorney Vanerian explained for a number of years the city has pursued voluntary removal of this hazardous water tower with no compliance. City Attorney Vanerian explained Mr. Leith has partnered with the owners and they have an agreement to get the water tower torn down. City Attorney Vanerian explained this is a positive for the city because it will avoid the financial cost of filing legal proceedings with the courts to have the tower taken down.
